We now have Instant Church Directory!

Attendees of the Annual Parish Meeting received an introduction to our new digital directory, but in case you missed it, here is the gist:

- Active members can access our directory either through the website (<u>instantchurchdirectory.com</u>) or by downloading the free app.
- Your login email must match the email that's listed in the directory. (The same email address I use for the weekly e-blast.)
- I've pillaged some photos from Facebook, but you can upload your own—or email/text one to me, and I'll do it for you.
- Everyone can update their own information as needed. (This generates an email for "admin approval," but this delay ensures heightened monitoring and security.)
- This directory will only be seen by other password-protected members.
 However, if you wish for additional privacy, you can opt to designate information private.
- Note that this platform allows for easy access to group lists, as well as birthdays and anniversaries!
- People can be searched by first or last name. Match those faces with names!
- And on the app, simply tap on an email address or phone number to email, text, or call!
- And a hard copy can be generated and printed any time, if desired.

Once we get the hang of this platform, I think we will all enjoy the ease by which we can be in touch with each other—and make more plans to do stuff!

Financial Update

At what time of day was Adam born?

A little before Eve.

Our financial documents are through September 2024. A couple of things to keep in mind is that 75% of the year has passed so that should be the benchmark as you look at a particular account. In addition, the budget has been created as one annual number – not by the month so an account could be over or under, simply due to timing. In 2025, the goal is to make a quarterly budget.

Financially, we are having a great year! We were thrilled to have a very generous, anonymous member, who donated a significant gift of funding for our beautiful piano, the Prayer Books and Hymnals, funding for our Outreach Programs and additional items not yet spent the \$\$ were deposited in October so they won't show up on the financial reports.

Revenues are \$171,585 or 86% of budget, which is favorable. Year to date, pledges are tracking right on budget at 75% (Remember this is 2024). Unpledged donations are doing very well!

Expenses are \$152,821 or 77% of budget, which is slightly unfavorable to budget. Recognize that when we look at revenues to expenses, we are still \$18,764 favorable.

While several expense groupings are unfavorable to budget, the biggest drivers to this are the piano, prayer books and hymnals. As I mentioned earlier, the revenue won't be reflected until October. Barring something unexpected I feel comfortable that we are in good shape for the balance of the year.

Diocesan information regarding Hurricane Helene By Deacon Mark

In the wake of the devastating damage sustained by the Diocese of Western North Carolina from hurricane Helene, our Diocesan Bishops and communications staff have been working to provide timely information and guidance to churches within our diocese. Daily emails and text messages were sent during and after the storm to access any immediate needs from churches within our diocese, and following the storm a special zoom meeting was held to answer questions and provide updated information concerning affected areas. A dedicated webpage has been created and is being updated weekly by communications staff. This webpage can be found at https://www.episdionc.org/blog/ways-tohelp-with-hurricane-helene-relief-efforts/ and includes important information concerning how best to support our sister diocese with financial and material donations, as well as how to partner with relief organizations already working on the ground in affected areas. Recently, a "work in partnership" link has been added to the webpage that links directly to the western NC diocesan webpage and gives current information concerning the status of churches in the western diocese and how best to support them.

Additionally, one of our own parish members, Steve Franke, has been working weekly with Samaritan's Purse in Yancey County and has a wealth of knowledge regarding how to sign up and deploy for clean-up operations. So, anyone seeking information concerning support and recovery efforts in the western diocese is encouraged to visit the Episcopal Diocese of NC informational page by using the above link, and to reach out to Steve Franke when you see him at church (also please see Steve's article concerning Hurricane Helene recovery included in this edition of the newsletter).

Disaster Relief Western North Carolina

Mother Jamie asked me to comment on some of my recent experiences related to the Hurricane Helene disaster relief efforts in Western North Carolina. On October 18, 19, 24, and 25, I was blessed to work with Samaritan's Purse, helping with their disaster relief missions in Mitchell and Yancey Counties. Based on my experience, I have signed up to work additional days with them in the coming weeks.

I'm a hands-on person and felt called to work in this area. I conducted much research in order to find the most appropriate way for me to serve. My way is not for everyone, as I was ready and willing to get down and dirty, literally. My research took me to Samaritan's Purse's website (spvolunteer.org) where I registered to assist them in their missions in western North Carolina. Their missions involve all types of work, not just the getting-dirty tasks.

My words cannot adequately express the unimaginable level of devastation in parts of these counties and elsewhere: rivers reaching massive flood levels with water flowing at unbelievable speeds and obliterating almost everything in its path; flood waters spreading outward across the land to inundate thousands of acres and homes; huge debris fields left behind everywhere the receded flood waters had reached; unimaginable mudslides sweeping away everything in its path including human lives; and trees crashing down on homes. Imagine for a moment all the personal items in your home and on your property that flood waters of 6, 10, 15 feet, and more, could/would touch. Now picture having to clear all those items out of your house and off your property: contaminated food, refrigerators, washer/dryers, upholstered furniture, keepsakes, standing water (what all is in the contaminated water – fuel, sewage, etc.?), drywall, mud, fish, downed trees, you name it. How large would your trash pile be? What's the cost to replace the items? How many of us "wise" people would've purchased flood insurance, if available, if we lived in the mountains of North Carolina. I submit, not many. How do you mentally and emotionally deal with the lost lives and irreplaceable personal items?

Having been there multiple days, I still can't get my head wrapped around the power and destruction of this storm, and more importantly, the hopelessness and despair many of those impacted must be feeling. On the 25th, I worked with many others helping a family clean out their previously flooded house – lots of those to work on. This household lost four family members and they've only found two of the four so far: one 1½ miles downstream; the other nine miles downstream. Heartbreaking, heart wrenching don't come close to capturing the level of hopelessness or despair in many of these families.

I've been inspired by God's presence and love at work in some of the worst of times for these families, and that most of the people I met are impressively hopeful and resilient. I witnessed hope beating back some of the folks' lingering hopelessness and despair as soon as we volunteers from all over the country set foot on their property to help them remove their contaminated belongings, all things heavy or light. We carted those things to the curb, creating massive trash piles for ultimate pick-up and delivery to a landfill. God's love brought us all together to help others which was/is an incredible sight to see and experience.

There is much work to do now and in the future. This experience reminds me that one of the greatest things we can do for others is to be present; to be in the moment with those who are struggling; to listen, commiserate, share a handshake, a hug, tears, and/or a few encouraging and understanding words. I encourage you to find your way to be present. If we are present, God will show us the way!

Home Advent Wreath Kits Available Sunday, December 1st

We are doing things a little differently this year. We invite anyone interested in creating their own Advent wreath to partake of our Advent wreath making kit to assemble your own wreath at home!

Available on **Sunday, December 1st,** the First Sunday of Advent, in the **Narthex**:

- 9:00am, after the first service.
- 9:45am after Formation and
- 11:00am after the second service.

The Advent wreath making kit includes:

- Florist foam (either on a charger plate or inside an aluminum circular pan)
- Candles (4 for Advent and the Christ candle for Christmas Eve/Day)
- Advent pamphlet with readings and prayers
- If desired, ribbon may be added to the kit.

Take the kit home; completely saturate the florist foam first; then use extra greenery from Christmas trees, outside plants, decorations, faux foliage - whatever you would like to create your personal wreath. The possibilities are endless. Add the candles, water frequently and carefully (check for leaks). Your wreath is ready!
